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## 6.1 Introduction

## 6.3 Engagement Activities Undertaken to Date

## 6.3.1 Stakeholder Engagement Activities Performed in 2020

The Project's ESIA process started in 2012, when the Project was being developed by EGL. The environmental consulting company SOFRECO was engaged by EGL to prepare an ESIA and a RAP based on the 2010 Feasibility Study prepared by Fichtner. Environmental and Social baseline surveys were conducted by SOFRECO in 2012 and some stakeholder consultations undertaken.

In 2019, after a period of remaining dormant, the Project was relaunched via a PPP with REL as the private partner. The engineering company TRACTEBEL conducted further Feasibility Studies and REL engaged SOFRECO to update the 2012 preliminary ESIA, and some further stakeholder consultations were undertaken. In Q4 2021 REL engaged SLR to develop the ESIA prepared by SOFRECO into a full bankable ESIA.

The 2021 preliminary ESIA prepared by SOFRECO included a series of stakeholder engagement activities, summarised in Table 6-2 below<sup>1</sup>.

#### 6.3.2.1 Stakeholder Engagement conducted during the 2022 Socioeconomic Surveys

#### A Stakeholder Engagement during the Qualitative Socioeconomic Surveys

In 2022, SLR also carried out a qualitative socioeconomic survey of the populations inhabiting the villages around the Project's footprint or utilising / owning resources which will be impacted by the Project. The qualitative social survey was undertaken from the 19 January to 2 February 2022. The activities of stakeholder engagement carried out as part of the qualitative survey consisted of:

- Informal discussions with economically and physically displaced people, aimed at understanding their resilience, plans for the future and perception of the Project's stakeholder engagements to date.
- Informal discussions with people who may lose access, to some extent, to natural resources which may be impacted by the project, such as wood collection, medical plants collection and domestic water usage.
- Informal discussions with people who will lose income opportunities as a consequence of land acquisition (land-based wage workers).
- Focus groups with women, men, vulnerable people and local authorities in the Rwandan villages of Nyagahanga, Ryagashyitsi, Ruganzo, Gatebe, Mwaro, Gombaniro and Mubombo, to discuss land acquisition impacts on local livelihoods.
- Focus groups with women, men, vulnerable people and local authorities in the Rwandan villages of Kayenge, Bugano, Kafunda, Nachihembe, Nachirongwe, Ibambiro, Bujenjere and Ruduha, to discuss land acquisition impacts on local livelihoods.
- Formal interviews with local authorities and agronomists to better understand the impact of land acquisitions on land tenure and farming dynamics.

#### B Stakeholder Engagement during the Quantitative Socioeconomic Survey

A quantitative socio-economic survey of households affected by the Project's land take in DRC and Rwanda was carried out 28 January 2022 to 10 February 2022 as part of the resettlement process. The survey aimed at collecting socio-economic information on the physically and economically displaced households in DRC and Rwanda by surveying 601 representative household (27% of all affected households).

The survey consisted of a socio-economic questionnaire (See ANNEX E-2) administrated using electronic forms on smartphones. The objective of the survey was to collect socio-economic information on the physically and economically displaced households in DRC and Rwanda, which had been identified in 2022 through a preliminary census. The information collected was related to:

- The demographic profile of the surveyed population, including nationality, ethnicity (in the case of DRC only), language, education, religion, age and gender.
- Current livelihood strategies, types of income generating activities, levels of cash circulating in the economy and existing financial management and risk sharing institutions.
- Land owning and renting trends.
- · Access to and use of natural resources.

Six hundred and one (601) households were randomly selected for the survey. This represents a sample of 27% of the affected households, as indicated in the table below. While all physically



displaced households were purposely included in the survey, the remaining economically displaced households were randomly selected from the census's database.

#### C Summary of Concerns Raised by Local Communities during the Socioeconomic Surveys

During the qualitative socio-economic survey, villagers raised a number of concerns about the land acquisition process and the consequences that this may have on their livelihoods. The constraints mentioned by the consulted populations were:

- Fear that they would be unable to afford buying new land after the losses due to land acquisition.
- Fear that men would take control of the money from compensation (expressed by women only).
- Fear that compensation money would not cover the costs of moving away, finding new land and either re-building a house or cultivating new crops.
- Fear of being left with the least fertile lands.
- Fear of losing income while trying to find new lands to cultivate.
- Fear of their house or part of their field not being counted (especially the 50m riverside stretch that they are not allowed to cultivate on).

The RAP has taken into account the above concerns and will be publicly disclosed locally. The RAP defines measures and entitlements addressing these concerns.

## 6.3.2.2 Recap of Stakeholder Engagement with Historically Marginalised /Batwa Communities

#### A Engagement Conducted by REL in 2023

As part of the project Social and Environmental Assessment to prepare the ESIA and RAP for the Ruzizi III Regional Hydroelectric Power Project, Ruzizi Energy LTD (REL) has collected additional information about the Batwa community in the project area, in Rwanda and DRC.

#### A.1 Interview with an Historically Marginalized Family

REL conducted an interview with the only one Historically marginalized family impacted by the project in Rwanda. The interview took place with the Historically Marginalized Family and the Social Economic Development Officer of the Cell the 9<sup>th</sup> of February 2022 in the Ryagashyitsi village, Murya Cell, Nzahaha Sector (Rwanda). The objective of the interview was to assess the living conditions of this impacted Historically Marginalized Family.



#### A.2 Interviews with Batwa communities

To collect additional information about the Batwa community in the project area, individual interviews were conducted with nine chiefs of households from Batwa population in Bujenjere and eight others in Ruduha both in Nyangezi cluster, in DRC. Three focus groups were conducted, one in Kamanyola, one in Ruduha, and another one in Bujenjere Nyangezi. All the interviews were conducted the 7 and the 12 October 2022. The interviews have gathered additional information on the socio-economic life of the Historically Marginalized People.

## B Engagement Conducted by Anthropolinks in the Frame of the Study of Historically Marginalised People in 2023

Intensive Interviews and focus group discussions were conducted in Swahili in DRC and in Kinyarwanda in Rwanda in April 2024. Interviews have also been conducted with local authority and civil society. A total of 17 interviews have been realized (7 in DRC and 8 in Rwanda).

#### B Engagement with Communities during the Social Baseline Survey

Potentially affected communities in DRC and Rwanda were given the opportunity to express concerns about the Project and potential impacts and risks during the social survey conducted in January and February 2022. Communities in Burundi were not engaged because no land acquisition is planned in Burundi. In addition, the ESIA has assessed that the incremental impacts on river hydrology, sediment transport and bank erosion in Burundi from hydropeaking operation of Ruzizi III will not be significant compared to the alterations caused by ~50 years of hydropeaking mode of operation of Ruzizi-I and -II.



#### C Meetings with Rusizi National Park Authorities

In addition to the meeting held in 2022, a second meeting was held 18 June 2024.

#### D Focus Group Discussions with Communities

To involve communities in the CIA process, a series of consultations were organised in May 2024. The consultations were in the form of Focus Group Discussions (FGDs). The purpose of the consultations was to inform the communities of the Project activities and to initiate discussions on themes and topics that are of concern to the people. The FGDs were organised in villages near the Ruzizi River in Rwanda, DRC and Burundi. In each village a FGD with both men and women, and with women only were organised. The duration of each FGD was 60-90 minutes, and there were about 8 participants of varying ages and positions in the village participating. The villages, country and dates of the FGDs are provided in Table 6-8 and more details provided in Chapter 12 Cumulative Impact Assessment.

## 6.4.2 RAP Engagement Programme

The engagement programme for the implementation of the RAP is not included in the SEP. It will consist of the following activities:

- Disclose the compensation and assistance packages outlined in the RAP to the affected households and local authorities involved in the RAP process.




Figure 6-1 - Grievance Redress Mechanism

- Establish and operate the Grievance Redress Mechanism (GRM) (see Figure 6-1).
- · Discuss with the affected households the assistance measures defined in this RAP.
- Announce the date of the payment of compensation payment and departure from the acquired land.
- Explain when, how, for how long the RAP will be publicly disclosed.

Table 6-10 below lists the stakeholder engagement actions which will be performed during the RAP implementation.

## 6.4.3 Specific Measures for Vulnerable Groups

Some vulnerable individuals may require additional support to ensure that they are able to receive, understand and respond to project-related information in an appropriate way. Table 6-11 lists all groups that may require specific communication channels to receive information on land acquisition and resettlement, alongside the measures that will be implemented to ensure fair and appropriate engagement. These categories of vulnerability were defined during the qualitative socioeconomic survey in 2022 in collaboration with the local population, according to the findings of targeted discussions and workshops on vulnerability. Chapter 8 of the ESIA presents in more detail the methodology used to consult vulnerable people and to identify vulnerability criteria which apply to the local context of the Project area.

## 6.4.4 Specific Gender-related Measures

Women may experience different forms of complications in trying to access Project-related information and to express their fears and wishes regarding the land acquisition and resettlement process. In order to ensure that all women involved, not only female household heads, will be suitably consulted and supported throughout the process, Table 6-12 summarises specific engagement measures which will be taken by the Project.

Women-headed households may be unable to join meetings due to their responsibility taking care of young or multiple children	Project to (i) make contact in advance to the household head to ensure that she is aware of the meeting and that she can leave the children with a trusted person and (ii) maximise participation by choosing a location for the meeting which is easily accessible for women.
Pregnant women should not walk to reach any public or individual meetings with project stakeholders, in order to protect her own and the child's health	Project to provide vehicle transportation to all pregnant household heads and all pregnant female spouses that may wish to attend meetings (see Below).
Female spouses of household heads may not have access to the appropriate information through their husbands	Project to provide a female-led and female only focus group with all spouses of household heads, alongside female household heads, to explain the compensation and resettlement process.
	Project to provide a training session for all spouses of household heads, alongside female household heads, to empower women on (i) shared and balanced management of compensation money, (ii) engagement of women in domestic decision-making for resettlement options
